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
Prom Preview: Are You "Enchanted" Enough?

Burkett followed in his father's footsteps, who also taught P.E. and driver's education at CHS. His mother also taught at the school until 2003.


"I enjoy teaching here because of the small population of students and because this is where I grew up," Burkett said. "I have roots here."


After his teaching career, Burkett says he plans to keep working on the water, fishing and hunting.


